TB as a disease of inequality – the impact of housing

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Who might be having video-observed treatment?

Directly observed therapy should be considered as an integral part of enhanced case management in complex cases such as those from underserved groups^{1.}

- people who are homeless
- people who misuse substances
- people who have been in prison
- vulnerable migrants

Video observed therapy found to be more effective than DOT, likely to be preferable across a broad range of settings²

Unhealthy homes increase the risk of

- respiratory illness
- cardiovascular problems
- mental health problems



Overcrowded homes increase the risk of

- mental health problems
- respiratory illness
- tuberculosis
- tobacco harm

Precarious housing & homelessness increases the risk of

- physical and mental health problems
- alcohol and drug misuse
- suicide
- tobacco harm
- tuberculosis

Underlying health issues can in turn raise the risk of being homeless or living in precarious housing

How can we help signpost people into suitable services?

 TB Action plan: 5.2.7 Monitoring the provision of access to practical skills training, for example, prescribing, phlebotomy, education or training in signposting patients to benefits and housing support



What support is available? – local authority services

- <u>Gov UK postcode checker</u> to find which local authority for that patient
- Mecclink website has contact details for each local authority housing service, duty to refer contact details and affordable warmth resources

Duty to refer

- The <u>Homelessness Reduction Act 2017</u> significantly reformed England's homelessness legislation by placing duties on local housing authorities to intervene at earlier stages to prevent homelessness in their areas, and to provide homelessness services to all those who are eligible.
- Additionally, the Act introduced a duty on specified public authorities to refer service users who they think may be homeless or threatened with homelessness to local authority homelessness/housing options teams.
- This includes emergency departments, urgent treatment centres and hospital inpatient services
