
The public health knowledge and intelligence function underpins the delivery of public health practice








Fingertips is the main platform for National K&I resources

Working in PHI

C50-60 PHI specialists across Yorkshire and the Humber

- Local authorities
 - part of wider PH team, or
 - subsumed into corporate Intelligence/Strategy/Performance function
- OHID
 - regional LKIS team covers North East & Yorkshire and the Humber
 - some members of distributed national teams based in region

High demand due to:

- COVID
- restructure/refocus of NHS ICSs & PHM

Working in PHI

Basic numeracy, analytical & interpretation skills still needed but

- increased access to datasets => need for skills in data management and linkage
- moving from Excel & Powerpoint to:
 - data manipulation programming languages such as R, Python; data science approaches
 - data visualisation PowerBI, Tableau

Trainee scheme started May22, the Louise Brewins Programme:

- 8 trainees, each of whom do
 - X2 year-long placements in different local authorities
 - Data Analyst apprenticeship
