

• Group discussions with Local Authority partners 13/15 Local Authorities, 51 people from range of roles



## Context and the air pollution challenge

Local Authorities ranged from large urban areas with high levels of traffic pollution, to small towns and rural areas with generally lower levels of air pollution.

Recent increases in prioritisation and interest in outdoor air pollution across the region.
